PATROL OPERATIONS DIVISION

Patrol Operations is comprised of 16 sworn officers under the leadership of a Major. Officers are assigned to one of four squads, each led by a Sergeant, working 12-hour shifts. Patrol Operations handles all dispatched calls for service, conducts self-initiated enforcement activities and provides high visibility patrols in hopes to prevent and deter criminal activity.

STAR Corridor Update

Officers handled **27** calls for service in this area; completed **107** park, walk and talk activities as well as **43** hours of traffic enforcement and general observation time. Officers had **118** community contacts and conducted **5** roll call meetings.

Patrol Highlights

On June 1, an officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle in the 100 block of Thompson St. The driver was arrested for DUI, refusal, underage possession of alcohol, and issued a summons for speeding.

On June 06, officers responded to 800 block of England Street and subjects were arrested for Possession of Schedule I & II and outstanding warrants.

On June 17, officers responded to the 100 block of N. Cottage Green Dr. for an assault call. After investigating, warrants were obtained for strangulation and malicious wounding. The suspect was located and arrested.

On June 15, an officer detected the odor of marijuana in the 200 block of Thompson St. After locating the source and investigating, a subject was arrested for possession of marijuana.

On June 18, officers attempted to locate a wanted individual on Jamestown Rd. After an investigation, the suspect was located and arrested for the warrant as well as providing false information to avoid arrest.

On June 27, 2018, officers received information about a possible protective order violation. With the help of investigations, warrants were obtained for an inmate at PRJ for the violation.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

Under the command of Special Operations Division, the **Investigative Unit** is comprised of three investigators led by Lt James Shelhorse. This operational component is responsible for the investigation of all felony and serious/repeat misdemeanor offenses reported to the police department. Additionally, this unit is tasked with proactive investigations into narcotics trafficking and other criminal behavior.

Investigative Highlights

Investigators responded to investigate a CART referral in reference to an adult not properly caring for 2 children. Report came in through schools system. Child care transferred to a responsible family member. The adult not providing proper care was later reported as missing and was located several days later and arrested in Stafford County for narcotics distribution, clearing a missing individual case as well as a narcotics complaint.

Investigators assisted in a counterfeiting/fraud call at a local business. Assisted by taking out multiple warrants on individuals involved.

Investigators responded to St Mary's Hospital to assist with a felony strangulation case. Warrants were obtained for the perpetrator.

Investigators conducted a quick operation to apprehend a subject wanted on multiple charges to include felon in possession of a firearms. He was taken into custody without incident.

Investigators assisted with the search for a missing juvenile. He returned home after a few days with a friend.

Special Operations and Investigators conducted a UAB ABC/OFF Operation to ensure compliance from 18 business locations in Ashland. No violations were committed.

Investigators instructed and participated in Firearms and All Hazards training.

An investigator assisted Hopewell PD with an investigations promotion panel.
