# PATROL OPERATIONS DIVISION

Patrol Operations is comprised of 16 sworn officers under the leadership of a Captain. Officers are assigned to one of four squads, each led by a Sergeant, working 12-hour shifts. Patrol Operations handles all dispatched calls for service, conducts self-initiated enforcement activities and provides high visibility patrols in hopes to prevent and deter criminal activity.

## STAR Corridor Update

Officers handled **18** calls for service in this area; completed **98** park, walk and talk activities as well as **33.5** hours of traffic enforcement and general observation time. Officers had **111** community contacts and conducted **0** roll call meetings.

## Patrol Highlights

On February 2, officers conducted a traffic stop in the area of England Street. The driver was subsequently arrested for DUI.

On February 7, officers investigated a number of larcenies from vehicles throughout the town. The investigating officer has developed solid leads and warrants are expected to be obtained soon.

On February 16, a traffic stop was conducted in the area of RT 1 & Wythe House Road. The driver was subsequently arrested for DUID.

February 22, officers conducted a traffic stop at the Fast Trac. A male subject was arrested for DUI

On February 26, officers observed a wanted individual in the 300 block of N. Snead Street. The subject was stopped and arrested for the warrant as well as both a misdemeanor and felony drug charge.

February 28, officers responded to Jamestown Road for the report of shots fired in the area. A male subject was arrested for being a Felon in Possession of a firearm and violation of Town Ordinance 12-27.

# SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

Under the command of Special Operations Division, the **Investigative Unit** is comprised of three investigators led by Lt James Shelhorse. This operational component is responsible for the investigation of all felony and serious/repeat misdemeanor offenses reported to the police department. Additionally, this unit is tasked with proactive investigations into narcotics trafficking and other criminal behavior.

## Investigative Highlights

Investigators responded to a B&E at a local business where tools were stolen and items were burned. An arrest was made within days on a local juvenile suspect for the crime.

Investigators obtained warrants and made an arrest for distributing illegal narcotics for a subject in Town who sold CBD oil products containing THC to an undercover Ashland investigator. He had been advertising on the local Ashland Residents FB page.

Investigators attended the monthly Hanover sex assault and child assault response team meetings.

Investigators assisted patrol units with collecting DNA for several vehicle break-ins.

Investigators responded to a suspicious death investigation at a local hotel. It was determined through the investigation to be a suicide.

Investigations continues work on the Burgos homicide case by completed multiple social media search warrants.

Investigators completed a digital forensic examination of a cell phone related to the suspicious death case.

Investigators assisted in locating multiple persons who were wanted on criminal charges and living in Ashland. One of the arrests led to the recovery of schedule I/II narcotics.
